



## gger Better Brain

Way back in the "before times" (before the dreaded C-19 raised its head), I was fortunate to be a part of the 2019 Bigger Better Brains Educator Western Australia cohort. We spent two glorious days working with Dr Anita Collins, learning about the impacts of music and the brain, and how to be better advocates for our amazing subject that literally changes students' brains.

I was so enthused by the course, I immediately signed up for the Facilitator course, which was scheduled inperson for August 2020. So... yeah. Anita couldn't get back into the state due to Covid-19 border controls and the course was postponed.

Finally, though, in 2023, Anita and her team have transformed the course into a fantastic online edition, which I've recently completed. It's a mix of online learning and tasks and then some Zoom sessions with Anita and the other participants.

Firstly, we had the opportunity to review what neuroscientists have been working on for the past four years. There have been some fascinating science happening in this space, and most of it still points to the positive impacts of music lessons on the developing brain.

Then we started to develop our advocacy skills further. We wrote and then delivered a 5-minute presentation that we would give to parents at a meeting. My focus was 'Why should my child start learning an instrument?' Using research collected and summarised by Bigger Better Brains, I explained how the brain is impacted when effective music learning happens and what benefits music can have over a lifetime. Our course-mates were our audience and they helped dissect and improve our presentations. This was particularly helpful for me as I was scheduled to present to my Year 4 parents about the Instrumental Music program beginning for their students in Year 5 about a week later! I had positive feedback from the parents who attended, which I definitely credit my course-mates with!

In the course, we also practiced writing and then workshopped a letter to a decision maker with some of our course-mates. It was so great to read other peoples' work and get their constructive opinions and positive additions to your own work. Although, admittedly, I did have an internal giggle when I was partnered with a lovely gentleman from a private school in Queensland. His "big issue" was that he wanted to get all his Year 4 violin students to begin in Year 3 instead - while my "big issue" was the cancellation of the entire music program for my Year 1 and 2 students. Initially I thought we didn't have too much in common, but through discussion and sharing, I realised that ultimately, we both wanted the best for our students, and we worked together to determine the best way forward in both of our situations.

I feel much more confident in advocating for my students and my music program after being a part of the Bigger Better Brains Facilitator course. I would highly recommend anyone who is interested in the why we should be promoting our courses - there is so much scientific research out there, and it is distilled so clearly within the Bigger Better Brains Educator and Facilitator courses. It's now up to us to share that information as widely as possible!

## Music at John XXXIII College

John XXIII College is a co-educational, independent Catholic school in Mt Claremont. The Music Program is an integral part of the educational philosophy around 'Cura Personalis' – caring for the whole person – and ranges from Kindergarten to Year 12 in diverse disciplines. We offer a comprehensive program that is founded in the classroom, and branches into the co-curricular, fostering a community love of singing and performing.

Our Primary students are involved in a wide variety of musical experiences. Composing is a key feature of all Primary programs; using combinations of standard rhythmic notation, pitch identification, tuned percussion, recorders, ukeleles and djembes to compose songs, rhythmic lyrics, notated pieces for instruments and accompaniment figures. Music skills develop through Primary from notation literacy, score reading and performance, with a constant mindfulness towards peer reflection on performances and rehearsals. Our programs are globally and historicallyinspired, with themes from African percussion, to Western Art orchestral traditions, to contemporary trends and even Gregorian Chant. Singing plays a central role in Primary students' musical experiences, implementing Kodaly-inspired pedagogy in the classroom space, and forming a key part of students' faith identity at the College through combined-years Liturgical Singing. And, of course, no Primary Music Program would be complete without the creative choral and instrumental arrangements for class musicals and assemblies, which are student-driven and linked to their musical literacy and performance skills.

Co-curricular programs began with our youngest students in Pre-Kindy, encouraging brain development and the acquisition of foundational skills. The Year 3 Strings and Year 5 Band Programs are supported by cocurricular ensembles in Years 4 – 6, with a diverse and inclusive range of vocal ensembles that includes two Primary choirs and a PP – Year 12 Chapel Choir, which leads the singing in the weekly community masses. Primary students are encouraged to embrace a love of sharing their musical gifts with their wider community, with concerts including Holy Week services, the Catholic Performing Arts Festival, Grandparents' Picnic, Eisteddfods and Breakfast Concerts, as well as the celebrations of season and school year at Christmas and awards concerts. This year, students from the Primary participated in the Australian Combined Schools Music Festival - its inaugural year in Perth, performing commissioned repertoire from renowned choral composer, Perry Joyce.

Alongside the comprehensive instrumental, choral and classroom opportunities for Primary students in Music, the Year 4 Musical is a highlight of the College calendar! The production provides Year 4s with the full experience of an auditioned stage show – costumes, lighting, sound, script, stage, choreography and fun – while strengthening their individual skills and resilience, as well as developing strong camaraderie and relationships with their cohort. This year's original musical, Little Shop of Horace, was also awarded the Loreto Sisters Award in the Catholic Performing Arts Festival!







John XXIII College branches from two streams to six in Secondary school, with Music and the Performing Arts a compulsory and vital part of both the Year 7 and 8 programs. A vibrant classroom music program in lower school offers students a mixture of skills-based, performance-based and creativity-based endeavours, designed to promote confidence, communication and ensemble skills, as well as integrating various mediums in music technology. Aside from classroom music, the College also offers a popular Year 9 Music Theatre course, which introduces the triple-threats of dance, drama and music in combination, to produce a one-act show at the end of each semester. Taking on the accessible and diverse philosophy of the new ATAR syllabus, middle and upper school Music classes explore a range of cultures, styles and eras, combining practical realization of concepts with inclusive content, culminating with ATAR in Years 11 and 12.

John XXIII College has a broad co-curricular offering in the Secondary school, ranging from traditional choirs, orchestras and concert bands, to contemporary groups, jazz and guitar ensembles, and chamber groups. Our aim is to include and represent the full array of student interests, in the knowledge that Music is a place where students often feel at home. We are fortunate to have an experienced, passionate and dedicated team of peripatetic staff, accompanists, administrators and teaching staff in the department, that caters for the K – 12 classroom program, ensembles and over six hundred students who learn an instrument or take lessons in voice. These staff oversee frequent performance from the College ensembles,

which include concerts, soirees and school functions, as well as to the community at St George's Cathedral, The Ellington Jazz Club, residents of local residential care establishments and neighbouring primary schools. In recent years, ensembles have toured to Sydney, performed at the stadium of the Perth Heat and joined in the Australian Combined Schools Music Festival. Of course, the highlight of the calendar for many students is the annual Music Camp. Held in New Norcia for over twenty-five years, the camp now occupies the historic Fairbridge Village, and empties the warren of every Secondary music student and ensemble for a weekend of music-making, community and camaraderie, with the 220-odd students performing a camp-concert as the finale. Finally, the Music and Drama departments join forces for one of the biggest events of the year - the College Musical - which celebrates its 30th consecutive year in 2024.

John XXIII College's Music Program hopes to inspire the minds and capture the hearts of our students, to share our gifts with our community, to nurture a lifelong love of music and to explore the possibilities for good and growth that it brings.



#### NOTICE OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Date: Tuesday, 16th January 2024

Time: 12:30pm

Purpose of the meeting: The Annual General Meeting will be held to appoint the new ASME WA Council for 2024 and report on the activities of the chapter for the previous year. An agenda, appointment of proxy form, postal vote form, council nomination form, and the 2023 AGM minutes will be emailed to all current financial members.

Council nominations from current financial members of the Chapter must be received by the Secretary not less than 7 days before the day on which the annual general meeting concerned is to be held. A person who is eligible for election or re-election may propose or second himself or herself for election or re-election.

Proxy: A member (in this rule called "the appointing member") may appoint in writing another member

who is a natural person to be the proxy of the appointing member and to attend, and vote on behalf of

the appointing member at, any general meeting.

Postal votes: A voting member who is unable to attend a general meeting may vote prior to the general meeting. Each postal vote will be counted with the votes made at the general meeting for each

issue being considered. A postal vote will only be valid if it fulfils the following requirements:

- (a) voting papers must clearly identify the member voting including name, address, signature and membership number;
- (b) votes must be in writing and received in hard copy format by the Secretary no later than 24 hours prior to the general meeting; and each issue to be considered at the general meeting must be clearly identified and voted on in the affirmative or negative.





#### **KEY POINTS:**

- June 2022 We appointed Admin for the Arts (Angus Golding and Emily Dittman) to carry out specific and negotiated roles and tasks to ensure more efficient and effective running of ASME WA's "behind-the-scenes" work.
- Have connected with Susannah Piek from Santosha Money Mastery to ensure that our Xero
  Account is up to date and reconciled correctly. This was only able to occur once the bank
  feeds had become live in Xero, which is now done.

With Xero working for us, we have everything in one place, making it easier for Treasurer handovers and communication amongst executive Chapter Council members and our administrator.

- We can automate our administration of ASME WA by syncing bank and financial information. This keeps our finances up to date because we can categorise and reconcile bank account transactions as they come in.
- We can track and pay bills on time and get a clear overview of accounts payable and cash flow.
- We are able to manage spending and submit or reimburse expense claims with Xero's expense management tools.
- We are able to accept payments online and connect to Stripe to get paid twice as fast if that's something that we do in the future.
- We can get copies of documents and key data into Xero automatically.
- We can manage and share documents, contracts, bills, and receipts safely anywhere.
- We can track finances with accurate accounting reports.
- This is a significant change to ensure that reports can be generated by Xero instead
  of the Treasurer using an Excel spreadsheet that has to be manually inputted across
  from accessing and viewing the bank accounts.
- Xero does the following for us:
  - o Sends invoices and quotes
  - o Enters bills
  - o Reconciles bank transactions
  - o Can set up payroll if needed
  - O Capture bills and receipts with Hubdoc
  - O Bulk reconcile transactions
  - O Short-term cash flow and business snapshot
  - O Automate superannuation
